PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE

I would like to take this opportunity to thank all the staff at MSMS for doing extra coverage on those many days that subs were unable to be found as well as for ensuring all students were safe during transitions.

We're starting to plan for next year and our February registration numbers, plus any new registrants this year, will determine our ability to take any new Out of Area students requests that are allowed to be submitted in April. Last August we had approximately 20 late registrants move into the area for late registration!

Everyone is looking forward to better weather and to getting outside but we encourage you to ensure your child strikes a balance between school work and play as this is the time to "pour it on". Our school performs well overall and we're proud of our students' accomplishments! At this time, we need to either' keep up the good work' or 'put our noses to the grindstone' to ensure all students do well academically and finish strong for the 2018 – 19 school year.

Professional Development is Key

- More than two decades ago the school year in Nova Scotia was increased from 190 to 195 days.
- One reason for this change was to accommodate in-servicing and Professional development for teachers without costing students valuable instructional time.
- Professional development is critical for teachers in their efforts to provide the best learning opportunities for students.
- According to recent data, teachers in Nova Scotia do more than 65 hours of PD per year (much of it during weekends, evenings, and summer months), while the school calendar allows for only 25 hours.
- Unfortunately, parents are not always aware of the benefits that professional development of teachers, and support staff, provides to students.
- Some would support that all PD activities occur during the summer months. The fact is, most new initiatives are introduced at the beginning of a school year, while others are introduced during the year for teachers to make appropriate assessments and enhance the teaching of these initiatives. It is necessary to support the teaching and learning with in-servicing at strategic moments in time.
- Educational programs, strategies, resources, philosophies, and initiatives continue to change at a rapid pace. Teachers must keep abreast of the evolution.
- Lastly, there is always staff turn over and often staffing is not complete until the end of August.

SCHOOL SUPPLIES: This is the time of year when school supplies may need to be replenished. Please check with your child to make sure he/she has enough paper, pens, pencils, erasers and so on to make it until the end of June. Thanks so much for your help!

GRADE SEVENS CODING WORKSHOP

During the last week of March, MSMS hosted presenters from KidsCodeJeunesse (KCJ). KCJ is a Canadian not for profit organization dedicated to empowering children and educators, with a particular focus on girls and children from disadvantaged groups, with the skills we all need to thrive in a technology driven society. By bringing digital learning experiences into the classroom and in communities, they teach Canadians how to be better thinkers and better creators in a digital world.

These sessions gave all grade seven classes the opportunity to experience coding with the Micro:bit (a single board programmable micro computer) and the online simulator app 'MakeCode'.

During the workshop, students and educators had the opportunity to create animations and interactive games, and to learn computational thinking concepts like sequences, loops, and modularization through activities both on and off the computer.

Thanks to resources supplied to us by KCJ for participating in the workshop, students and teachers at MSMS now have access to Micro:bits for curriculum enhancement through activities involving coding and physical computing.

Tristan Davies and Ryan Wilson Grade 7 - Whale of a Problem


Congratulations to all who participated! MSMS was well represented and we are so proud of all of you!

Community News

Last year, Long and McQuade in association with the Dartmouth Music Department ran the yearly Beginner Band Camp. We will continue to work together and run the camp again this year from August 26-30 from 9am-12pm at the Long and McQuade store in Dartmouth.

The L&M Beginner Band Camp is an opportunity for ANY HRCE student enrolled in grade 6 band, for 2019-20, or who is starting a new instrument for school band, to get a thorough introduction to their band instruments.

Our one-week beginner band program is a 5-day program designed to teach the fundamentals of playing an instrument in the Grade 6 Band Program. At the end of the week we will show off the talents with a Friday concert!

In addition to the L&M Beginner Camp we will run a Band "Fun-damentals" camp for Junior-Intermediate concert band students in the afternoon from 1pm-4pm.

L&M's Band "Fun-damentals" Camp is a one-week afternoon experience designed to encourage band students from Grade 7-11 to fuel their musical enthusiasm and boost their playing skills. Talented musicians are invited to camp with the expectations of taking their performance skills to the next level. Students will receive varied activities such as full band rehearsals, sectional instruction, small ensembles, master classes, ear training, rhythm training, sight reading, and a Friday concert with a conductor and instrumental specialists.

Not done yet we will also be running from August 19-23 from 9am-12pm the L&M Jazz Camp for aspiring jazz musicians of all ages who wish to explore the nature of jazz and develop the skills needed to play jazz and improvise with more confidence and understanding

How to send your kids to an HRM Recreation summer camp in 2019 This

information was prepared to help SchoolsPlus staff, families, and others. It is not an official HRM Recreation document.

WHEN TO REGISTER, AND WHY: If you can, register at 10:00 am, Wednesday, April 10, 2019.

- Registration opens at 10am on April 10. Some camps fill right away. If HRM Recreation camps are important to your family, do what you can to register at 10:00. Later that day, some camps will be full.
- HRM Recreation has a brand new online registration system. This system can handle thousands of registrations at once, without crashing. This means that **some camps may fill within minutes!**
- If you have Internet access, and you've done your prep work (see below and the next page), you can register each child for camp in about 5 minutes. It won't take much time!
- You don't have to register online. You have two other options:
 - o To register by phone, call 902 490 6666. You will need camp barcodes and a credit card.* o To register in person, go to any HRM Rec Centre & pay with cash, cheque, debit or credit card*.
- You have to pay* when you register. See info. below on the new system for 50% and 100% discounts! * Credit cards accepted by HRM Recreation: Visa, Visa Debit, MasterCard, or MasterCard Debit

WHAT CAMPS ARE AVAILABLE?

HRM Recreation summer camps are now posted online at: https://www.halifax.ca/recreation/programs-activities/programs-registration. On this web page, look for two things: 1. Scroll down to find a heading called "Summer 2019 Programs."

- Under this heading, you'll see a list of HRM communities.
- Click on a community name, and see a list of summer programs. Select camps from these lists.
- Each camp has a number, or bar code. Write down the bar codes of the camps that interest you.
- Make sure the camps you choose are for your child's age and the correct dates.
- You may want to look for camps in more than one community. You can make a list with your first and second choices, in case your first choices are full. 2. **Also see a solid blue box that reads, "Create account/login."** See below for how to create an account.

WHAT YOU MUST DO BEFORE REGISTERING YOUR CHILD FOR CAMP:

1. Create an online account with *MyRec.* Do this BEFORE April 10!

You have to do this, even if you already have an HRM Rec account. This is because HRM Rec has a brand new online registration system, called *MyRec*. It will take 10 or 15 minutes to create accounts for everyone in your family. Go to:

https://www.halifax.ca/recreation/programs-activities/programs-registration. Click on the blue box with the words, "Create account/login."

2. Will you need financial help to pay for camp?

Your family may qualify for a 50% discount, a 100% discount, or no discount. Your HRM Rec discount depends on your income and the number of people in your family. The amounts are listed below:

Discounts (subsidies) are granted according to Revenue Canada's 2018 Low-Income Cut Off:

1 or 2 people in family: \$31,544 or less for **50%** discount; \$15,772 or less for **100%** discount. 3 people in family: \$38,780 or less for 50% discount; \$19,390 or less for 100% discount. 4 people in family: \$47,084 or less for 50% discount; \$24,042 or less for 100% discount. 5 people in family:

\$53,402 or less for 50% discount; \$26,701 or less for 100% discount. 6 people in family: \$60,228 or less for 50% discount; \$30,114 or less for 100% discount. 7 or more in family: \$67,055 or less for 50% discount; \$33,527 or less for 100% discount.

- Go to https://www.halifax.ca/recreation/programs-activities/funding-access-application. Read all the details on this page. Download, print, and complete the 1-page form, "Funding Access Application."
- ASAP, take your completed form and your June 2018 Canada Child Benefit assessment to your nearest Community Recreation Centre. A full-time staff member at the Centre reviews and approves all applications. This person will keep all your information confidential. It *may* take up to 2 weeks to process your application. Do this now so that your discount is in place when you register for camp.
- In the *MyRec* system, you only apply for financial aid once a year. Your discount is valid for 12 months. The discount is recorded as part of your *MyRec* account. When you register for any HRM Recreation programs, you and your family members will get this discount automatically.
- If you applied for this discount within the past few months, your discount should appear on your new *MyRec* account. You don't need to apply again right now. It's good for 12 months.

DOES YOUR CHILD NEED ONE-ON-ONE SUPPORT?

Most children who require one-on-one support at school require it at summer camp, too. HRM is committed to providing safe & accessible programs for everyone to enjoy. HRM Recreation urges parents to request this support when you register. This will help ensure your child has a safe & successful time at camp!

There are new inclusion request procedures for summer 2019:

1. Go online between April 10 and 26, and enter the location and weeks that you prefer. **Please register**

your child using barcode 00010260, instead of registering with the barcode of your chosen camps. All children requiring one-on-one support must be registered under this barcode by April 26. 2. A staff member will contact you in May to choose your preferred dates for support (up to 3 weeks) and camp location, and to discuss your child's support needs. You will pay once support is confirmed.
